A few weeks ago our congregation served the Harvest Table and the very next Sunday our Gospel lesson was the feeding of the 5,000. (I don't think this was a coincidence!) In John's account we find Jesus and his disciples watching a crowd that had been following Jesus come toward them. Jesus asks his disciple, Philip, where he thought they could buy bread for the crowd since the crowd had not eaten in a while. Philip stated the impossibility of them providing bread for everyone. But the disciples found a boy with five loaves of bread and two fish, his meal. The boy gives up his food to the disciples and Jesus. Jesus then takes the meal, blesses it, and begins to break it into pieces. The breaking continued, multiplying until everyone in the crowd was full.

The child in this story has much to teach us, as children often do. As he handed his meal to the disciples and Jesus, he likely wondered what difference such a small amount of food could make among the large crowd. His meal was small, and the need was so great. But then, Jesus took hold of the food and began to break it into pieces. Jesus took that which was insufficient and used it to accomplish His purpose.

But before that could even happen, the boy and to release the food he possessed. At some point, he had to resolve in his heart and mind that the food was not his to hold. Was he hungry in that moment? Possibly. Did he have doubts about whether his food could be helpful? Probably. Did he wonder if he would get any of his food once he released it? It is likely. But he let go of his food.

The child trusted Jesus. He trusted that Jesus would use his meal to care for his needs and the needs of others. In Jesus's hands, the boy's small meal became great. But it took an act of trust to get the meal into Jesus's hands. The boy handed over his meal which was an act of trust and sacrifice. But the boy did not feed the 5,000. The boy and the disciples were simply participants. The people were fed by Jesus.

The same is true for us. God desires us to trust Him with our possessions and work to advance His Kingdom. We give and work, knowing that it is God who is in control, and it is His work that causes multiplication. We witnessed that as we served the Harvest Table. Our congregation provided the actual food, but God blessed it and used it to further His Kingdom.

May we continue to trust God with our resources, allowing Him to multiply them in ways we could never imagine!

Pioneer Lutheran served about 87 guests at the Harvest Table Monday, July 22, 2024. The menu included soft shell tacos with a variety of toppings, watermelon, and grapes as well as homemade bars. The Thrivent grant helped provide many of the items, but Pioneer members donated the hamburger, cheese, tomatoes and bars. We had 13 Pioneer volunteers help in three shifts: preparation 3 to 5 pm, serving 5 to 6:30 pm and cleanup from 6:30 to 7:30 pm. Many were there the entire time. Volunteers cooked the hamburger and prepared toppings to serve, set tables, served the meal, and cleaned up which included putting all 18 tables and 144 chairs away. Volunteers came with giving hearts, hospitality, teamwork, and compassion! Thank you to EVERYONE who helped in any way. Many guests came up to personally thank us for the generous meal and all the fresh food. It was truly a


